Unique Features of the Program

Program Outset

The program was designed specifically to offer traditional courses, cutting edge evidence-based training, and supervised internship experiences that are increasingly required by state and national agencies and credentialing bodies.

Individual Attention

Students work with a team of faculty who hold doctoral degrees and possess relevant practitioner experience.

Hybrid Delivery Model

The blended/hybrid delivery model of education and training provides a structured sequence of courses which address foundation theory, skills, and professional ethical practice guidelines in Year I, followed by advanced coursework and field experience in Year II, which builds upon core competencies in assessment, counseling, consultation, and specialized elective clinical areas.

Residencies

There are 2 residencies per year. Each last 5 days (Wednesday through Sunday).

Practicum and Internship

The practicum and internships are the capstone component of professional training and provides students the opportunity to demonstrate and refine skill proficiencies learned as part of the university training program.

Program Accreditation

Unlike many nontraditional programs, Union's program offers a structured academic track designed specifically to serve the educational and professional needs of students wishing to pursue state and national licenses or certifications needed to practice in many states and organizations.

A Certificate in Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling may be earned concurrently with the Master's degree. Upon completion of six (6) chemical dependency specific courses integrated within the curriculum, students will be eligible to sit for the National Certification Commission Examination for Addiction Counselors (NCAC). The MA-CMHC has completed their self study and site visit to apply for accreditation through the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related

Programs (CACREP). The board is expected to vote and make their decision in January 2018.

Mission Statement

Union Institute & University's MA-CMHC program holds its mission close:

To educate future counselor practitioners to identify and treat psychological problems and issues in a variety of clinical, educational, and workplace settings using evidence–based and best practices.

Throughout their education, students will be required to engage in critical inquiry; to thoroughly examine and interact with the literature, theory, and research in the field of clinical mental health counseling; and to pursue and share the results of applied research. Emphasis will be placed on developing exemplary clinical and related therapeutic skills and gaining an understanding



of research procedures and applications in accordance with the scholarpractitioner model of education. Furthermore, students will be educated broadly to work with diverse cultural backgrounds and populations and to adhere to all professional and ethical guidelines.

The program is designed for students who are interested in pursuing a career in clinical mental health counseling at a master's level; seeking graduate training in preparation for doctoral work in Counseling Education & Supervision or closely related field.

MA-CMHC students complete a broad based and comprehensive clinical training specialization that prepares them to pursue licensure as Clinical Mental Health Counselors. Licensed Clinical Mental Health Counselors practice independently in a variety of settings such as hospitals, community mental health agencies, and colleges and universities, treating clients who struggle with everything from adjusting to life to serious mental illnesses. The major in clinical mental health counseling uses an evidence-based clinical practice approach with an emphasis on addressing the mental health needs of a wide variety of populations.

Clinical Mental Health counselors prevent, diagnose, and treat mental, emotional or behavioral disorders and provide services when clients experience life



stresses that interfere with their mental health. Clinical Mental Health counselors serve at all levels of schools and universities, hospitals, mental health agencies, rehabilitation facilities, business and industry, correctional institutions, religious organizations, community centers and private practice.

This program should be of interest to those wishing to pursue careers as professional mental health counselors and who seek licensure as LCMHCs or LPCs. Entering students have experience in a variety of backgrounds, such as education, psychology, business, nursing, social work, military, and pastoral and religious settings. Some students, upon graduation, plan to pursue doctoral work in the field. Many have professional work experience and almost all have some experience related to the field of counseling, either paid or unpaid.

Counseling

According to the American Counseling Association, counseling is defined as a professional relationship that empowers diverse individuals, families and groups to accomplish mental health, wellness, education and career goals.

Individuals interested in working as a licensed professional counselor often desire to private practice, community based counseling agencies, schools, hospitals, veterans affairs, or other social service areas. The common theme despite location, is that individuals in the field of counseling seek to help people work through their life's problems. This master's program should be of interest to those wishing to practice evidence based counseling focusing on areas of mental health wellness, including the diagnosis and treatment of those with mental health disorders.

Program Information

Enrollment

MA-CMHC is a 60 credit program of study. The program is offered with full-time and part-time options to meet the needs of working professionals.

Full-time master's students typically complete three (3) courses for the equivalent of nine (9) credits during the fall term; three (3) courses for the equivalent of nine (9) credits during the winter term; and the equivalent of twelve (12) credits during the summer term (may include internship), for a total of 60 credits over two years.

Trimesters are four months in duration to provide a sequential, organized, and supervised educational experience which better prepares students for entry into professional practice. Students may enroll beginning in January, April or August.

Residency Requirements

Residencies are a critical component of the program. They fulfill the total academic experience at Union Institute & University by offering course-based and advanced topic presentations, seminars, cohort engagement, time with faculty and advisors, and an overall environment designed to support the student in engaging with theory and practice. All students are required to attend two residencies per year, during fall and spring. Residency dates are

posted in August for each academic year. Residency schedules are emailed to students approximately three weeks prior to each residency to allow students time to plan their on-campus attendance and activities.

The campus-based residency includes the following activities:

- Professional Seminars and Training Workshops
- Research Seminars
- Faculty Presentations

- Expert Guest Speakers
- Panel Discussions
- Student Presentations

Practicum and Internship

The practicum and internship training are the capstone experience of mental health counselor training and builds on the knowledge and skills learned in the academic coursework and applied training experiences of the program. The minimum requirement for a Union Institute & University a 100 hour practicum experience, followed by a 600 hour internship experience. However, state credentialing and licensure requirements should be reviewed to determine the actual number of hours to be completed in the internship, as individual states may require more than 600 hours (such as 900 hours).

Typically, students complete one year of internship to meet degree and state requirements. Candidates may earn nine (9) credits for field training,

depending on their individualized goals for future licensure and certification. Internship placements have included hospitals, community mental health clinics, schools, and private practice settings.

Transfer Credits

Applicants may transfer up to 12 graduate credits from another regionally accredited institution. The admissions committee must provisionally approve all transfer credit requests at the time of application. Upon admission to the program, the assistant director will make the final decision on the appropriateness of transfer credit. To qualify for transfer, such credits must be:

- a. Listed on an official transcript as master's level credit
- b. Granted by an accredited college or university within the past five (5) years
- c. Identical in scope and content to the course(s) being replaced by transfer credits (as evidenced by course syllabi or similar documentation)
- d. Awarded with a grade of B or better
- e. Not used toward another degree

Only transfer credits directly relevant to the program's goals will be accepted.

Tuition

Note: Not included in tuition are travel expenses to weekend residencies, as well as all necessary lodging and meals. Residency charges (in addition to travel expenses) are additional.



Certificate in Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling

MA-CMHC also offers a graduate Certificate in Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling, designed to help students acquire discipline-related specialized knowledge and skills in substance abuse counseling.

The certificate program can begin at any time by enrolling for courses in the prescribed sequence. The courses are taken entirely online, with the option to attend three weekends of residency during the year.

Upon completion of the education hours/courses in the certificate program, students will have met all education requirements to be eligible to sit for the National Certification Commission Examination for Addiction Counselors (NCAC).

Certificate Options

Embedded: For enrolled degree-seeking students

- 18 credit hours (six courses)
- Tuition assessed at standard graduate credit-hour rate

Stand-Alone: For those with undergraduate degrees not seeking MA-CMHC degree

The stand-alone graduate certificate allows individuals to earn required education hours for certification without enrolling in the master's degree program. Stand-alone certificate applicants may enroll in courses individually or in courses leading to the certificate.

- Six courses (270 education hour equivalent)
- Three non-degree graduate credits earned per course (45 education hour equivalent)
- Offered in a one-year sequence
- Begin in fall, winter, or spring/summer term
- Start in fall, complete coursework in August, sit for National licensing exam in October

Admissions requirements

Admission to the MA-CMHC program is open to applicants who hold a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution or a recognized international institution of higher education.

The admissions decision is based on the following:

- A grade point average of 3.0 or better (on a 4.0 scale) in the major field of study and in all subsequent graduate work. Under special circumstances, a candidate with an extensive work history or other overriding qualifications may be admitted with a slightly lower GPA.
- An interview with the assistant director of the program or a member of the faculty, if deemed necessary.
- A completed online application detailing personal and professional goals and reasons for pursuing graduate study.
- Three professional recommendations, one of which should be from a person qualified to evaluate clinical potential.
- A minimum TOEFL score of 500 for applicants whose native language is not English.
- Applicants must hold an undergraduate degree. It can be in any field. In certain circumstances, exceptional applicants may be granted provisional acceptance, full acceptance being contingent upon the successful completion of nine (9) credits of graduate coursework taken during the first term of enrollment.

Applicants to the stand-alone Certificate in Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling program must have a Bachelor's degree and GPA of 2.5 or greater to be considered for entry. Students who are accepted with a GPA of less than 3.0 must successfully complete all Certificate courses before they can apply for admission to the MA-CMHC program.

Application Process

The admissions committee reviews and acts upon completed the MA-CMHC application folders on a monthly basis. Completed application folders must contain the following:

- Non-refundable application fee
- Application Essay
- Official transcripts from all post-secondary schools attended
- Three (3) letters of reference, including one from someone qualified to assess the applicant's clinical potential


